Little did those of us in attendance at the March dinner meeting know that that would be the last time we'd be together as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic! Our speaker that night was Patrick O'Donnell, a research scientist from Rookery Bay Estuarine Research Center, who specializes in sharks. His very interesting talk covered how the Picayune Strand renovation is affecting the salinity of the water going into Faka Union Bay, Fakahatchee Bay and Pumpkin Bay and the impact it has on the types of fish in that area. The estuaries in the 10,000 Islands are important breeding grounds for many fish, crustaceans and reptiles so the health of the water is important to the survival of these species. The most common shark found in these areas is the Bull Shark. More photos from the dinner are on pages 9 and 10.






SUNSHINE NEWS

Visual Distress Signals

All boaters should familiarize themselves with the various distress signals and the pros & cons of each. U.S. Coast Guard regulations require powerboats 16 feet and over and sailboats 26 feet and over to have three unexpired day/night flares on board.



Most boaters are familiar with the handheld flares specifically designed for boating. Other types of flares include flare pistols, which shoot flares into the air, and small floating cans of smoke-producing flares for daytime use.

Each type of flare has different benefits. Airborne flares can be seen from greater distances, so if you are stranded, they might be best at alerting boats that are farther away. Handheld flares pinpoint your location; use them when another boat is reasonably close and heading in your direction. Use smoke flares in daytime only as the orange smoke is more visible in bright daylight than regular flares, however, they don’t count toward the Coast Guard’s three-flare requirement.

Consider buying more than one type of flare: handheld, smoke, airborne or parachute. Combination kits contain a variety of devices and an orange flag, which can be useful in bright daylight. Also, consider buying the new. Coast Guard-approved electronic flare device which satisfies the three day/night flare requirement. Electronic flares are much safer than conventional flares and can save you money in the long run. For night use only, electronic flares come with an orange signal flag for day use. Don’t forget to ensure your batteries are fresh.


Always wear protective gloves and hold handheld flares overboard when in use or carry a pole to keep them away from passengers and the boat’s deck. In a pinch, you can tape the handheld flare to the end of a boat hook and hold it overboard to light it. Don’t let the flare burn down too far or it could catch your pole on fire or damage your boat hook.

Unused, expired flares can still save your life; save a few of your recently expired flares for emergencies, even though they don’t count for compliance purposes. Dispose of very old flares as you would any other hazardous material. Call your local fire department or recycling center. Be sure the hazardous waste collection folks know you are giving them a box or bag of flares.



UPDATES: from the Board of Directors and Executive Director:

1. Our headquarters building in Raleigh will be closed the remainder of this week. Calls and emails will be monitored. A message was sent to all district and squadron commanders today.

2. Also, with regard to squadron and district meetings, votes, changes of watch, etc.: while we do not have a formal (unbelievable, I know, given the size and scope of our Operations Manual and Bylaws) procedure for conducting business when a national emergency has occurred, the National Committee on Rules position is “...for squadrons and districts to conduct business by the best available means while preserving the safety and security of our members”; thus you may make use of electronic means.

3. The Educational Department is in the process of creating a Virtual Meeting Indoctrination seminar which will be sent to all district and squadron commanders. Target: in hands early next week!

4. Vessel Safety Examiners: The USCGAux has recommended that examiners suspend performing Vessel Safety Checks until further notice. We support that recommendation.

America's Boating Club, City of Marco Island, Collier County, and the US Coast Guard Auxiliary Successfully Work Together for Improved Boater Safety—Part 2

Editor's Note: This is the second of a three part series about the work America's Boating Club-Marco Island is doing to improve boating safety in our local waters. A special thank you to Lt Kathleen Reynolds, AP, for authoring this document.

In 2015, MISPS leadership, recognizing the still ongoing and serious need for ATON repair, asked former Commander Carl Thieme to Chair a revived group, now named the Cooperative Charting Committee. The Committee of 14 squadron members would develop a current data base identifying needed repairs, replacements, or repositionings. The Committee also invited local Coast Guard Auxiliary Flotilla 95 to join them in this effort. Critical to the eventual success of these efforts was building working partnerships with the US Coast Guard, Collier County Coastal Zone Management Group, and the City of Marco Island's Department of Public Works. All three agencies are responsible for ATON maintenance, but in different geographic areas.

The long term goal of the Cooperative Charting Committee was to make information on the condition of ATONs readily available on the internet to key government agencies and to the boating public. Committee member Cliff Winings developed (and to this day, continually refines) the data base and monitoring system needed to accomplish this goal; he has recently, for example, integrated current data with Google Earth so that each agency and the public can locate each ATON by its GPS coordinates and then see its actual condition.

Carl and Committee Member Andrea Battaglia, attended every meeting of the City of Marco Island's Waterways Committee for some ten months starting in 2015, and reported each month on the survey's most updated findings.

At a meeting of the Waterways Committee, Carl gave a Power Point presentation about the significant state of ATON disrepair. He also gave a brief overview of the elements being recorded in the survey process, with emphasis on the location and condition of damaged or missing ATONs. Presentations included a series of photographs of ATONs in the Marco River, Caxambas Pass, and around the Coon Key light. Worsened conditions could be demonstrated due to the availability of the data base compiled by MISPS members nine years earlier. After significant effort and communication with city and county staff and with the US Coast Guard and its Auxiliary, at the February 2016 meeting of the City of Marco Island's Waterways Committee, responsibilities for ATON maintenance were finally defined.

Most recently compiled data shows that for an area from Capri Pass in Marco to Lostmans River, approximately 20 nautical miles south of Marco Island, there are 320 ATONs. Collier County has responsibility for 215 of those; the Coast Guard for 68, and the City of Marco Island for 37. Basically, all ATONs in Collier Creek, Collier Bay, Smokehouse Bay and Factory Bay are the responsibility of the City. Other ATONs around the City, not owned by the Coast Guard, are the responsibility of Collier County.

Tim Pinter, Public Works Director for the City of Marco Island, acknowledges that it was a confusing time prior to clarifying agency responsibility for ATON maintenance. When an understanding was reached, then City Manager Roger Hernstadt authorized the initiation of needed work. In 2016, the City replaced 6 Idle Speed, No Wake signs, and 11 Markers. In 2017, 12 Idle Speed, No Wake Signs, 7 Markers, 4 Danger Shoal signs, and 4 Water Depth indicators. In 2018, 7 Idle Speed, No Wake signs, and 8 Markers, and 1 Marker in 2018 and another in 2019. That work will restart when the nests are vacated. Mr. Pinter also noted that the completed MISPS inventory of signs and markers in and around the island, including those in the Marco River and around Goodland was useful for the location and maintenance of damaged or destroyed signs or markers. Estimates of the survey work done some years prior suggested that the volunteer efforts completed by MISPS members could have cost the City of Marco Island upwards of \$300,000. The survey also provided the City with the location of illegal or unnecessary signs placed on private docks or seawalls. The City is now working with Code Enforcement to have those signs and markers removed.

Carl Thieme and his team, including Lee Konecke, Navigation Officer and key liaison with the US Coast Guard Auxiliary Marco Island's Flotilla 95 also pursued a corollary track related to ATON identification and maintenance with Collier County. They met numerous times over several years with Chris Darco and Bryan King from Coastal Zone Management (CZM), and presented them with all of the information that had been found. Prior to an April 2019 meeting with CZM, several Cooperative Charting team members met to establish four priority levels among the ATONS needing repair or replacement. In addition the data base was refined by identifying ATON locations by their geographic channel designation on Chart 11430 as well as by their GPS coordinates.

Collier County's Coastal Zone Management staff basically agreed with the Cooperative Charting Committee's findings and the initially determined priorities; a limited number of changes were made during discussions. The consensus was that the critical criteria for priority ATON replacement / repair must be related to improving boating safety. For example, on the Blackwater River, there are ten ATONS on the chart, but five of them are missing and it was agreed that these should be replaced and two ATONS should be added to better mark the entrance to the river. A second example was the entrance to the Port of the Isles where the distances between some ATONS was too great to assure accurate channel markings for proper navigation. Third, in Caxambas Pass, a new Green Marker #5 with a light was needed in addition to a new outer mid-channel marker to be placed one to two miles out in the Gulf to mark the beginning of the entrance to the channel. Coastal Zone Management staff determined a focus on repairing or replacing ATONS that needed the most immediate attention. Of the 215 ATONS for which Collier County has responsibility, 48 were identified as being in poor condition and 36 in fair condition; of those, currently, 55 have been repaired or replaced. The repairs included installing new signs, straightening or removing 20 piles, and installing 17 new fiberglass piles.

Boating Maintenance to do during a Pandemic!

If you're looking for things to do in these days of social distancing, here are some boating maintenance ideas that you could add to your project list:

- ⇒ Check VHF and GPS antenna connections.
- ⇒ Inspect your props.


